01. Essential Facts




- Children in Foster Care: Over 437,000 children are navigating the foster care system.
- Awaiting Adoption: There are 118,000 children and youth in America waiting for their forever homes.

02. Journey Through Foster Care

- Adoption Wait Time: Children typically wait 3-4 years or more.
- Foster Care Duration: On average, children spend 12 to 20 months in foster care; 10% experience more than 5 years.
- Entry and Exit Ages: Average age for entering foster care is 7 to 8, with the exit age close to 7 to 9.




03. Outcomes and Demographics



- Reunification and Adoption: 51% of children reunify with parents or primary caregivers, while 52% are adopted, often by foster parents.
- **Gender Distribution:** The foster system consists of more boys (52%) than girls (48%).
- Racial Demographics: Foster children are 44% White, 23% African American, and 21% Hispanic.

04. Age Specific Insights

- Early Childhood Entry: 26% of children entering foster care are under the age of one.
- Older Youth in Care: About 22% of youth in foster care are age 13 or older.



05. Reasons for Foster Care Placement



- **Neglect:** 61% of children are removed from their homes due to neglect.
- Parental Drug Abuse: 34% of removals are due to parental drug abuse, a significant issue within families.
- Caregiver's Inability to Cope: 14% of children are removed because their caregivers cannot cope with their needs.
- Physical Abuse: 12% of removals are due to physical abuse, a stark reality for some children in the system.

06. Challenges and Mental Health

- Mental Health and Stability: Foster children face emotional, social, and academic challenges, including higher rates of PTSD compared to U.S. war veterans.
- Youth Aging Out: 20,500 youth age out of foster care annually without permanent families, facing higher risks of incarceration and lower graduation rates.
